

1.	Read 2 Tim 2:14. (a) Paul tells Timothy to keep reminding them of "these things". What is Paul referring to? (See 2 Tim 2:1-13)
	(b) What does Paul mean by "quarrel about words"? What kind of quarrels was he referring to? (Look at 1 Tim 6:4-5 for one example.)
2.	Read 2 Tim 2:15. (a) What does it mean to be able to "present yourself to God as one approved"? What would this look like in your life?
	(b) What motivates people to "quarrel about words" or engage in "godless chatter"? Why is this not fitting for a workman approved by God?
3.	Read 2 Tim 2:16-19. (a) How will irreverent chatter lead to the spread of ungodliness? (vv.16, 18b)
	(b) What were Hymenaeus and Philetus teaching, and how have they affected the Christian community of their time? (cf. 1 Tim 1:20, also 2 Tim 2:18)
	(c) How does God's Word answer the teachings of Hymenaeus and Philetus? (v.19)

4.	How would you summarise the core thrust of 2 Tim 2:14-19?

OBSERVATION AND I	NTERPRETATION
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•	Read 2 Tim 2:20-21. (a) In v.20, Paul uses two different categorisation systems for the articles in the large house. What are these two categorisation systems?
	(b) What is Paul's purpose in using this metaphor here?
2.	Read 2 Tim 2:22-26. (a) Paul gives three instructions in vv.22-23. What are these three instructions?
	(b) How are the three instructions in vv.22-23 linked to what comes before? (cf. v.21)
	(c) In v.23, Paul warns Timothy for the third time against controversies (cf. vv.14, 16-19). How does he restate the negative reason for this warning (v.23b)?
	(d) How should the Lord's servant act in controversies (vv.24-26)? How does this add to what Paul has said earlier in v.15?
	(e) What is the difference between the attitude of the Lord's servant and the attitude of the false teachers involved with the controversies? (vv.24-26) Why is this important for us as we seek to disciple others?

3.	Our goal is to be workers approved by God – according to Paul in 2 Tim 2:20-26, what preparations
	do we need to make to reach this goal?

4.	Consider the description of the Lord's servant in vv.24-26. Do you think this describes Christian
	responses to controversies within the Christian faith as well as controversies with non-believers? What
	surprises you here?

5.	In our everyday lives, what rhythms or habits have we put in place to intentionally fit ourselves for
	God's service? (cf. v.22)

6.	Share an instance in your life where you have been impacted by someone who can be described by
	2 Tim 2:24-26. How has that person changed your life? Have you had a chance to be such a person
	for someone else?

DISCIPLESHIP POINTERS

- As believers, we serve God and no matter what type of material we are, we seek to fit ourselves for this service, which means putting aside what is dishonourable in our lives.
- As believers, we are to flee from sin and seek to become more Christlike in the company of other believers.
- Being a Christian means being a servant of the Lord, which also means behaviour befitting of the Lord's servant – we should not be quarrelsome but kind, able to teach, patiently enduring evil, correcting with gentleness.
- The Lord's servant seeks for others to know God and come to Him this is what directs our actions.

2 Timothy 3:1-9

Description of False Teachers

How do you know what is fake news and what isn't?

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1.	Read 2 Tim 3:1-5. (a) What will happen in the last days that make it terrible?
	(b) Compare these people described in vv.2-4 to someone who obeys the two greatest commandments in Matt 22:36-40, and to the blessed in Matt 5:2-11. What are the differences?
	(c) What does it mean to have "a form of godliness but denying its power"? (v.5) How is it possible for the people described in vv.2-4 to appear godly? What is the difference between these people and someone who truly is godly?
	(d) Why does Paul tell Timothy to "mark this" (ESV: "understand this") in v.1? What does it have to do with the further instruction in v.5 to "have nothing to do with them" (ESV: "avoid such people")
2.	Read 2 Tim 3:6-9. (a) How does Paul describe this second set of people in v.6? How are they related to the first set of people?
	(b) Who are targeted by these people and why? (vv.6-7)
	(c) What does it mean for us to be "always learning but never able to acknowledge the truth"? How should we gain true knowledge? (cf. 1 Tim 5:4; Titus 3:14)

- (d) Jannes and Jambres are named in Jewish extrabiblical sources as the Egyptian magicians with Pharaoh in Exod. 7:11 (full account in Exod. 7-12). Were they successful in opposing Moses? How does this help you to understand what Paul means in v.9?
- 3. What major instruction is Paul giving to Timothy in this section? In what ways would this apply to us today?

APPLICATION

- 4. Many of us are very good at hiding the true state of our spiritual lives from others, and even from ourselves. How should our relationships with fellow Christians change so that we will not be able to pretend godliness and so that we will be able to gain true knowledge?
- 5. No one likes to admit that they have been fooled, or that they are wrong. Yet we are to identify false teachers and avoid them. How will you approach your fellow Christians to "gently instruct" (2 Tim 2:25) if you think that they might have been taken in by false teachings? How would you like your fellow Christians to approach you if they think you have been taken in?

REFLECTION

Write down a key lesson and a key verse from this study.

How should we pray and change in response to what we have learnt?

DISCIPLESHIP POINTERS

- We are in the last days and ungodliness is all around us, even within the church this is not a call for suspicion and infighting, but a call for carefulness and discernment.
- In such an ungodly environment, it is hard for us to stand firm (Eph 6:10-18). This is why we need the help of the Holy Spirit, and why we need fellow Christians around us to speak the truth in love into our lives, pointing us towards God.
- False teachers and false teachings are attractive and capture those who are weak easily but these will eventually show themselves to be folly against the truth of God's Word.
- Though we ourselves may not be weak and captured by false teachings, our part is not to quarrel
 about these (2 Tim 2:14, 16, 23) but to point others to God's truth gently (2 Tim 2:25), allowing
 God's Word to expose their folly in God's time.

	(c) What does Paul say about the lives of those who want to live a godly life in Christ Jesus versus evil men and imposters (vv.12-13; cf. Rom 1:21-25)? Who is undergoing true harm?
2.	Read 2 Tim 3:14-17. (a) What instruction does Paul give to Timothy here? (v.14)
	(b) What reasons does Paul give for this instruction (vv.14-15)? Do you think that these are convincing reasons?
	(c) How does Paul describe Scripture in v.16? What is the Scripture he references (cf. 2 Peter 3:16)?
	(d) What does Scripture do, and for what purpose (vv.16-17)? How have you seen them being used in these ways in your life?
	(e) Why does Paul talk about Scripture in vv.16-17? What does it have to do with his message in 2 Tim 2:14-3:17 and what he continues to say in 2 Tim 4:1-5?
3.	Consider the whole of 2 Tim 3:10-17. How has Paul's life demonstrated to Timothy what his instructions

- We should continue living out the gospel while expecting suffering, following the examples of those who came before us, with Scripture guiding us and equipping us.
