What part of a story do you think is the most important – the beginning, the middle, or the end?

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1.	Read Gen 12:1-3. (a) What did God tell Abram to do, and for what purpose?
	(b) Why will God bless those who bless Abram and curse those who curse Abram?
	(c) How does Gen 12:1-3 signal the beginning of God's redemptive mission to the world? (Conside the events of Gen 11:1-9.)
2.	Read Gen 12:4-9. What did Abram do? How does this begin to accomplish God's redemptive mission of making Himself known to all nations?
3.	Read Exodus 19:1-6. (a) What has God done for Israel prior to this? (v.4; cf. Exod 1-18)
	(b) What response is God asking of Israel and what does this have to do with God's redemptive mission to all the nations? (Consider Exod 20-23.)
	(c) What does it mean for Israel to be God's treasured possession, a kingdom of priests and a holy nation? (vv.5-6)

4.	Read Jonah 1:1-3, 4:1-4. Who were the Ninevites and why did Jonah not want to go to them? (Consider both Israel's relationship with Assyria and God's character as stated in Jonah 4:2.)
5.	Read Jonah 4:5-11. (a) Why was Jonah angry about the vine?
	(b) Nineveh is being compared to the vine. What are the similarities and differences between Nineveh and the vine?
	(c) What is the difference in Jonah's attitude towards Nineveh and Jonah's attitude towards the vine? Why is there this difference?
6.	Jonah ends with God's question, which remains unanswered. What do you think the answer is intended to be and how does this match with the message of Gen 12:1-9 and Exod 19:1-6?
7.	How has the story of God's redemptive mission to make Himself known to all nations developed through these three texts?
AF	PLICATION
8.	First Peter 2:9-10 tells us that we Christians, the Body of Christ, are now "a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people belonging to God" – these are terms taken straight out of Exod 19:1-6. (a) What does this tell us about our role in God's redemptive mission to make Himself known to all nations?
	(b) God's redemptive mission is not simply a mission to give us salvation individually but to constitute for God a people belonging to Him. We not only belong to God but also to each other as both a community of redeemed people and a redeemed community. In what ways can we (as a redeemed community of redeemed people) reflect the redemptive compassion and justice of God to the world

around us?

Mission is the Goal of the New Testament

Have you watched multiple seasons of drama series, or read multi-part book series? How do the following parts link with the previous parts?

OBSERVATION AND INTERPRETATION

1.	Read Matt 28:18-20. (a) What instruction is Jesus giving to his disciples, and what does he base his instructions on?
	(b) Why is it important that Jesus is with us always, to the very end of the age? How is Jesus with us? (cf. John 14:15-19, 16:1-3, 16:13-15)
	(c) Read Gen 12:1-3 and Exod 19:4-6. How is Matt 28:18-20 similar and/or different?
2.	Read Rev 5:6-12. (a) What are we told about the Lamb in vv.6-8? What does this tell us about his status and his identity?
	(b) What has the Lamb done, and what has this accomplished? (vv.9-10)
	(c) In Exod 19:3-6, Israel is given a new status as a kingdom of priests, a holy nation; in 1 Pet 2:9-10, Christians are identified as a royal priesthood, a holy nation; and in Rev 5:10, men from every tribe and language and people and nation are identified as a kingdom and priests to serve God. What does this tell you about God's purposes and God's mission?

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3. Consider the Bible as a grand narrative of redemption. What do our five texts for the month add to this narrative?

DISCIPLESHIP IN COMMUNITY*

- **Pray**: Pray for specific people that your group wants to reach out to with the gospel. Pray for courage, and strength to proclaim the gospel, and for your lives to reflect the gospel, being a light on the hill to draw others to know God.
- Act: As a group, intentionally reach out to one or two people to join you in Bible study and fellowship.
- Act: Commit yourself to join an Evangelism Equipping course as a small group, or to accompany a pre-believer friend to Christianity Explained and/or Lessons on Assurance.
- Worship: Spend time together as a small group praising and worshipping God.
- **Reflect and Act**: Consider how you conduct your lives outside of church commit yourself to one change in your life so that your identification with Christ and/or your gospel living is more intentional. Ask your group to keep you accountable for this change.

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
